Life at the Pace of the King of Our Forests

Crossing the McGerrigle in a Day



Summer trail running workshop - FREE

In August, the Parc national de la Gaspésie Mountain School, in partnership with the kinesiology department of the Université du Québec à Rimouski (UQAR), is offering two workshops on a fast-growing sport: trail running.

Workshop #1: Introduction to trail running (beginner)

Discover trail running, learn how to get started in a progressive way, as well as tips and tricks (running techniques, preparation, equipment, nutrition & hydration, etc.). The workshop is followed by a trail run of about 2.5 km along a park trail.

Workshop #2: Refine your trail running knowledge and skills (intermediate)

Improve your skills and performance by putting advanced training tips into practice. Learn about recovery methods, injury prevention, increasing training volume and more. The workshop is followed by a 6 km trail run in the park.

CONSERVE FOR TOMORROW



Have you ever heard of invasive alien plant species (IAS)? These non-native organisms are spreading all over the planet, posing a challenge for the conservation of natural environments, specifically in protected areas such as national parks. These IAS compete with native plants, harming local biodiversity.

An ongoing study, carried out at the Station d'étude montagnarde (SEM) by Anthony St-Jean and supervised by Luc Sirois and Guillaume de Lafontaine, has identified 107 species of invasive alien plants in the Parc national de la Gaspésie. Among these, at least 55 are progressing in altitude, representing a challenge for the maintenance of the integrity of the flora specific to alpine environments.

Initially found at low altitudes in areas frequented by humans, such as parking lots and campsites, IAS are found in greater numbers here. As we move further away from these propagation zones, their presence decreases. However, although the shade of the forest canopy partially slows down the growth of IAS, they are able to climb to higher altitudes via footpaths. The trampling caused by hikers reduces the thickness of organic matter, which facilitates their colonization.

The results show that high-altitude areas of the Gaspé massif are being actively colonized by invasive alien plants. This phenomenon is constantly expanding and is therefore closely linked to urban development. For this reason, it is everyone's responsibility to play an active part in this conservation issue.

A few tips to slow the spread of invasive alien species:

1. Do not pick plants or transport them outside their habitat.
2. Stay on trails and developed areas at all times.
3. Inspect and clean your shoes or boots before and after each outing. Dispose of soil, mud, plants and other visible organisms in the waste.
4. Do not transport firewood from one place to another as invasive insects and parasites could hide in it. It is strongly recommended that you buy your wood locally.

Our national parks

Given the millions of visits to our national parks annually, harmful behaviors can cause permanent damage to the environment and negatively impact the experience of other visitors. Let's do our part to care for these extraordinary nature sites so we can all enjoy them for years to come.

5 GOOD PRACTICES TO ADOPT IN NATURE



Stay on trails and in designated visitor areas

Taking shortcuts can destroy vegetation.



Do not gather dead wood*

To preserve the natural environment, it is prohibited to remove natural elements, including animals, plants, dead wood, and rocks.



Do not feed wildlife*

Feeding wildlife negatively impacts their natural feeding habits. Keep all food out of reach of animals.



Keep your distance when observing wildlife

When animals are repeatedly disturbed, their natural behaviors can change, and they can develop problems to feed, find a mate, and communicate among themselves.



Respect the peace and tranquility, and comply with curfews

People come to national parks to relax and enjoy nature. Please respect curfews and avoid playing music at all times.

*Failure to comply with rules governing parks and authorized activities is considered a violation of the *Parks Act* and *Parks Regulation*.
